Oktoberfest: Celebrate German Culture!

Oktoberfest is a seventeen-day long festival held in Munich, Bavaria, Germany during late September and early October. It is held in an area called the Theresienwiese (also called the d' Weisn for short). Visitors also consume large quantities of food, which include sausage, chicken, cheese noodles, sauerkraut, and roast ox tails.

The festival is also known for its wide availability of beer.

The first Oktoberfest took place on October 12, 1810. It was originally a horse race held in commemoration of the marriage of Crown Prince Ludwig and Princess Therese of Saxe-Hildburghausen. In 1816, carnival booths began to give away prizes of silver, porcelain, and jewelry. In the year 1880, the city government approved the sale of alcohol. In the 1900's, the game booths and dance floors were re-organized to make more room for guests and musicians. As a result, the booths became large beer halls.

For those who prefer a non-alcoholic Oktoberfest (or who can't go to Germany), there is the Cullman County Oktoberfest, which celebrates its twenty-first anniversary this year. It begins Sunday, October 1st and ends the next Sunday. Some of the events include a quilt show, a golf tournament, a German lunch, a church choir concert, and the Burgermeister's Ball at McGukin Civic Center.

during the month of October that are designed to scare the pants off of unsuspecting thrill seekers. Birmingham's very own Sloss Furnace is a must see for both teens and adults.

From 1882 to 1971, Sloss Furnaces transformed coal and ore from surrounding acres into hard steel. There were no breaks, there were no holidays; there was only the furnace and its constant hunger for more and more coal. The supervisor over the graveyard shift, Mr. Wormwood, was nothing short of a slave driver. Many thought that the workers had finally had enough of Wormwood's slave driving, and fed him into the furnace--but no workers were ever brought to trial. Sloss Industries soon discontinued the graveyard shift, citing numerous reports of accidents and "strange incidents" that decreased steel production. Workers complained of an "unnatural presence" they increasingly encountered throughout the work site.

Though there has been no steel production at Sloss since 1971, year after year more adrenaline junkies have returned for the haunting festivities. Tour guides offer a walk through the furnace where the history is explained. While waiting for your tour, you can watch scary movies, get a psychic reading and enjoy refreshments such as funnel cakes, colas, and burgers. You can see for yourself on Thursdays, Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays starting September 29th. The price for admission is \$15.00 per person. Group pricing is available.
